Welcome

Thank you so much for your interest in supporting Trussell.

We are an anti-poverty charity supporting a community of food banks across the UK. We refuse to stand by while so many people can't afford to eat, keep warm, and pay the bills.

We campaign locally and across the UK for a more just and compassionate society - where everybody has enough money for the essentials, and no one needs a food bank to survive.

Until that happens, we provide emergency food, and practical support and advice, for people left without enough money to live on.

Our work with churches

Churches, and the part they play in supporting food banks, have always been vital to our work.

In 2000, Paddy and Carol Henderson started the first Trussell food bank, following a call from a mother in Salisbury who was struggling to afford food for her family. Supported by their church, the Hendersons launched Salisbury Foodbank in the garden and garage of their home, providing three days' emergency food to local people who had been left without enough money to live on.

Trussell (then called The Trussell Trust) was founded based on a legacy gift left by Carol's mother, Betty Trussell. The food bank model designed by Paddy quickly gained traction and, in 2004, our first church networks were established. They linked churches with local food banks so they could further support people facing hardship, while church volunteers generously provided their time.

Over the years, our community has grown, with more than 12,000 churches now supporting over 1,400 food bank locations – alongside 40,000 volunteers, hundreds of thousands of community groups and schools, and millions of people across the UK.

As a community, we share insights and learning, to build a compelling case for change. Food banks may be a lifeline for so many people – but we know they are not the long-term solution. We believe social justice must go hand in hand with social action – calling for a future where we can all afford life's essentials, and no one needs a food bank to survive.

A <u>Biblical vision</u> for ending hunger together

He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God.

This verse inspires us at Trussell to deepen the ways we support churches to get involved with food banks and campaign for change.

Loving mercy

Micah 6:8 (NIV)

Loving mercy is all about how we respond to people facing financial hardship with radical kindness and compassion. Churches and individuals can do this by supporting food banks or other similar charities for as long as they are needed. This can be through donations, financial support and volunteering.



Acting justly

Acting justly involves learning about and speaking out against unjust systems, like our inadequate social security system which is pushing people to the doors of our food banks. Calling on decision-makers to make changes is part of acting justly, but it also means looking at the relationships we have and considering who holds power. We must ask: whose voices are heard and how can we live in solidarity with people who are facing financial hardship?



Walking humbly

Walking humbly with a commitment to justice in our relationships means finding ways to create community together with people facing financial hardship. Together we can ensure there are no barriers to belonging in our churches and community spaces and that the contributions made by every person are equally valued. Our faith teaches us that we are all made in the image of God: we need each other and are inter-dependent. Each of us have different skills and experience, and together we can find the wisdom and creativity we need to build more just and compassionate communities.





How can we love mercy?

Our community of food banks is stretched to breaking point as more and more people are being driven through the doors of emergency food providers, while fewer people are able to donate regularly.

We literally could not keep the lights on in our food banks without the support of churches - who generously provide venues, encourage volunteering and organise food collections.

If you can help us, your support will make a huge different to people in your community who are facing hardship and hunger.



What you can do

On your own:

- Pray for people in your community who are forced to use a food bank.
- Download the BanktheFood app (bankthefood.com), which lets you know the items most urgently needed by your local food bank.
- Follow your local food bank on social media.
- Contribute to your local food bank when you are shopping.
- Volunteer if you have time.
- Give financial support if you can.
- Commit to sharing the needs of your local food bank in your church or workplace.

As a church:

- Set up a collection point for your local food bank.
- Pray for your local food bank and for people accessing emergency food.
- Invite someone from your local food bank to speak to the church community.
- Give regularly to the food bank.
- Make your local food bank the focus of a Harvest service.
- Include news and donation requests from your local food bank on your website or in your weekly updates.





Our food bank has five local churches who support us – with an ambassador in each, who shares stories and reports from the food bank with their congregations. As a group, these churches agreed to name us as their charity of the year!

This means that each church took responsibility to do a fundraising event event for us, organising a pie and pea supper, coffee mornings, and a quiz and games night.

Five churches sharing the responsibility of us being their charity of the year means it wasn't a big pressure on one church. The churches are really close now, and I've never seen multi-denominational churches work so well together.

How can we act justly?

The vast majority of the general public agree that it is wrong that so many people have to rely on food banks in the UK - the seventh richest country in the world.

We know that our social security system is inadequate, and - through our Guarantee our Essentials (GOE) campaign - we are calling for changes that would ensure everyone has enough money to cover life's essentials, such as food and bills. While being able to afford the absolute essentials might not sound like the fullness of life promised by Jesus, it is an achievable and practical step in the direction of justice.

We also believe that acting justly is about the way we live in communities – both within our churches and in the wider neighbourhood. In many food banks, local organisers and mobilisers are working with people facing hunger and hardship to work for change together with local councils and other statutory agencies. We would love to see churches getting involved with these local movements that challenge the drivers of poverty, and are led by people with lived experience of hardship.



What you can do

On your own:

- **Pray** for people in power to work towards a social security system that is fit-for-purpose.

As a church:

- **Pray** for social justice in your church services and gatherings.
- Order resources to help your church explore the injustice of hunger: we can send you our campaign pack, conversation cards, tablecloth packs, The Hardship Times newspapers and more.
- Show the GOE film in your church.
- Convene meetings between local decisionmakers and people who are struggling against poverty.
- Invite people working to organise or campaign against poverty to speak in your services.
- Build friendships with local decision makers and people in power.

people referred to food banks experience severe social isolation – being in touch with people socially once a month, or never.

We believe that every church has the potential to be a community where people facing hunger and hardship can fully belong, as equal and valued participants in the household of God.

In so many spaces there is the idea that some people's contribution is more valuable, while other contributions are easily dismissed. Could your church be a place where everyone's voice carries equal weight?

Listening well to one another and standing in solidarity together can help form a culture of justice. It's also important that as many people as possible are involved in making decisions to help shape their church community. Churches like this can have a transformative impact (both in their own neighbourhoods and more widely) as models of what it might mean to live the prayer 'your kingdom come, on earth as it is in heaven'.

What you can do

On your own:

- Use our Shared Journey Bible studies: reflections on scripture written by people who have faced financial hardship.
- Find opportunities to spend time with people in your community that you don't already know, and may bring you a different perspective.
- See if you can volunteer with your local food bank or a local organisation that brings people together from different backgrounds.
- Read Invisible Divides by Natalie Williams and Paul Brown which explores removing barriers to belonging in church.

As a church:

- Together, watch our 'Cup of Tea' film (trussell.org.uk/cup-of-tea), which highlights the transformative potential of a warm welcome, a listening ear and a cuppa.
- Offer a space of hospitality (such as with the Place of Welcome network placesofwelcome.org.uk) which is open to people of all backgrounds, including people facing financial hardship.
- See if you can support your local food bank with offering a cup of tea to everyone who comes through their doors.

- Consider your church through the eyes of someone facing hunger and hardship. Are their barriers to people belonging?
- Use our **Shared Journey Bible studies** in your home groups or as a Lent Course.
- Encourage different people in your church to share something of their faith journey, and perhaps, where they have encountered God in their struggle against poverty.

How we can belong in church

"Quite often, our traditional church setting isn't as welcoming as we'd like it to be for people - for some, things can feel too formal, and simply sitting down for an hour is too much. Some people come to our meetings five minutes late; some people come and leave. But we do as much as we can to enable everyone to take part.

We have a community meal on a Sunday, but we are explicit that you don't have to come to the service beforehand if you don't want to. But more and more people are encouraged to do so, partly because they know they're welcome to come and be as they are. There's no expectation of behaviour to belong in this place."
